

The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) emphasized in its research brief, "COVID-19 and the Drug Supply Chain: From Production and Trafficking to Use," that the current pandemic has tremendous impact on drug use. The lockdown and other strict protocols implemented by countries around the world resulted to harmful patterns of drug use, especially among people who inject drugs. The report also stated that based on the experiences of the economic crisis of 2008, it is fair to assume that the economic downturn may lead to reductions in drug-related budgets among Member States, and an overall increase in drug use, with a shift towards cheaper drugs.

Considering this current context, it is imperative that the ASEAN Member States (AMS) redesign how to deliver prevention interventions to ensure that they are responsive, and adaptive while remaining context-relevant.

Thus, the ASEAN Training Center for Preventive Drug Education (ATCPDE) has facilitated a series of webinars on *Rethinking Preventive Drug Education (PDE) for the New Normal: The ASEAN Experience*. The Center, which is funded by the Dangerous Drugs Board (DDB), is based in the College of Education, University of the Philippines. Aside from the DDB, the ATCPDE is composed of key government





agencies which include the University of the Philippines, Commission on Higher Education, Department of Education, Department of Health, Department of Social Welfare and Development and Philippine Information Agency.

The webinars aim to provide a venue for sharing country experience in developing a PDE continuity plan; and to increase the knowledge of prevention managers and practitioners in redesigning prevention programmes amidst COVID-19.

Official representatives from the ten (10) AMS who are involved in drug prevention work participated in the said free and closed webinars. Guidelines and protocols were set by the organizers for the efficient facilitation of the webinars.

ATCPDE Director Francis Grace H. Duka-Pante presented an overview during the first webinar session. Each AMS shared a 20-minute presentation highlighting the prevention initiatives that are being conducted amidst COVID-19. This was followed by a question and answer part.

During the last day of the webinar, Mr. Mark Michael M. Montehermoso discussed "Online Platform Navigation, Online Trends, Youth's Social Media Habits & Behaviours, & Proper Use of Social Media Platforms for PDE Advocacy." DDB Permanent Member Undersecretary Jose Marlowe S. Pedregosa graced the closing ceremonies of the webinar series.

The webinars were held for six (6) consecutive Wednesdays from 10:00 to 11:00 AM Philippine time, on October 7 to November 11, 2020, via Microsoft Teams.



















